# 2010 Tanzania Demographic and Health Survey (TDHS)

The 2010 Tanzania Demographic and Health Survey (TDHS) provides up-to-date information on the population and health situation in Tanzania. The 2010 TDHS is the fifth national Demographic and Health survey conducted in the country. Repeated surveys allow for an analysis of trends over time.

The survey is based on a nationally representative sample. It provides estimates for rural and urban areas in the Mainland, for Zanzibar, for each of the seven zones, and, in most cases, for each of the 26 regions.


# **Trends in Household Electricity**

Percent of households with electricity




# **Trends in Literacy**

Percent of women and men age 15-49 who can read




# **Trends in Fertility**

Births per woman




# Trends in Use of Modern Methods of Contraception


Deaths per 1,000 live births



## **Trends in Vaccination Coverage**


Percent of children 12-23 months who have received all basic vaccinations

(BCG, measles, and 3 doses each of DPT-Hep B-Hib and polio)




# **Nutritional Status of Children**




